Since 1938, the Sight Center has worked to prevent blindness and promote independence for those with vision loss.

Prevention Program

One of the greatest tools we have to prevent blindness is vision screening. Each year the Sight Center screens more than 10,000 children and 500 adults. About 8% of the children we screen are referred to an eye doctor for further evaluation and 92% of those referred need glasses or other treatment to correct a vision problem.

Vision screening is an invaluable tool endorsed by the Pennsylvania Optometric Association and Healthy People 2020, our nation's health initiative. The earlier we screen children, the greater success we have with their treatment. Children with poor vision don't necessarily know how well they should see. Their vision may blur, they may see double, or have good vision in only one eye. It's critical for us to reach this population at an early age.

In addition to vision screening, the Sight Center provides eye health education in the community. Our staff takes age-appropriate programs into schools, daycare centers and community organizations, helping us reach thousands of individuals of all ages with messages about general eye care and safety, eye health across the years and the impact of nutrition on the eyes.

Eye Glasses

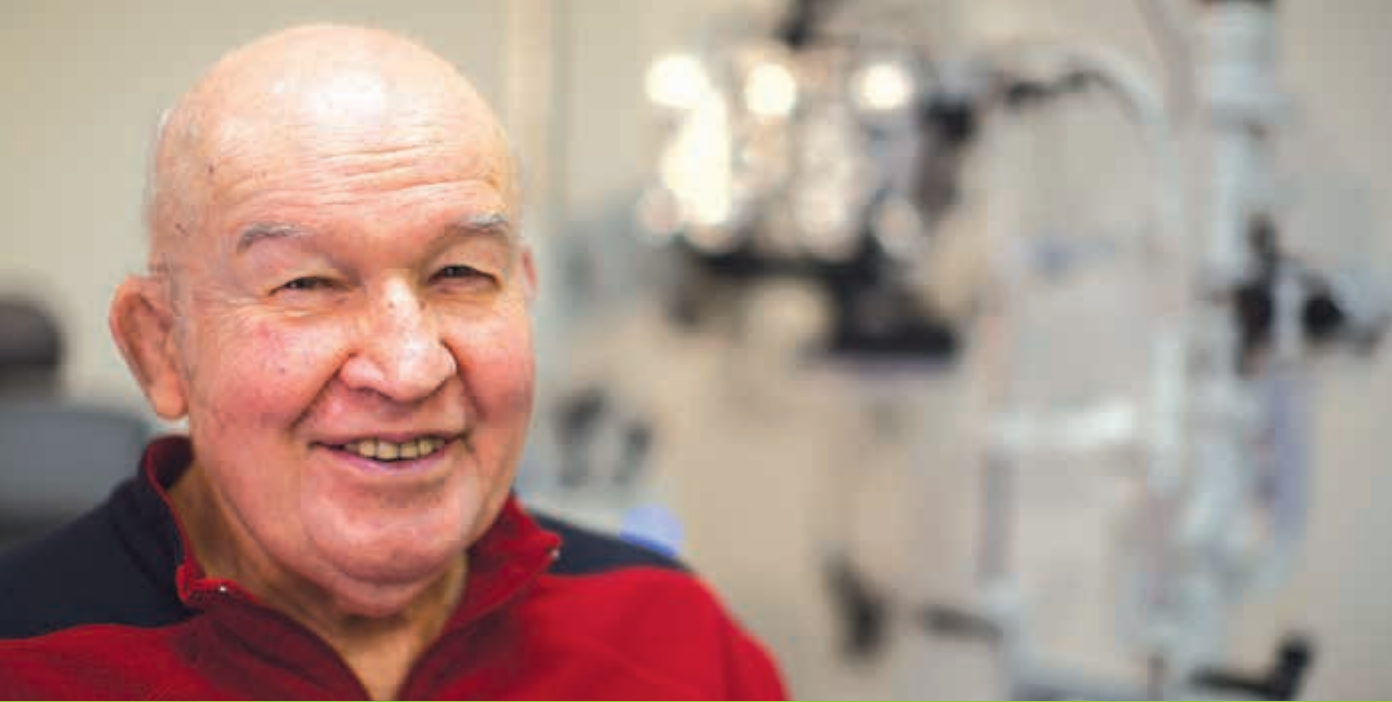

Experience Youth Program

Losing vision at any age can be challenging. Losing vision as a young child is often overwhelming for the child and parents. The Sight Center is here to offer hope and support through meaningful services that can truly make a difference in the everyday life of a child or teen who is blind or visually impaired.



The Sight Center's Experience Youth Program includes after-school enrichment activities that build on instruction in personal care, safety, physical fitness, mobility, fine motor coordination, adaptive equipment use and assistive technology training. A unique feature of our program includes a variety of summer day camps. Ranging from arts and pottery to a week-long sports camp, these camps not only are fun, but they offer another opportunity for kids to practice and develop new skills, increase independence and build lasting friendships.

Our Service Areas:

The Sight Center provides services to people who are visually impaired in Erie, Warren, McKean, Elk, Cameron, Potter and Jefferson counties. When warranted, clients have access to all of our services including transportation, prevention services, life skills and social supports. Outside of Erie, the Sight Center provides support services to more than 150 people each year.

Our Fundraising Efforts:

The Sight Center relies on annual fundraising activities to support foundational services and special project needs. Directed by the Executive Director, the Marketing and Communications Coordinator and a Development committee of the Board, these activities include an annual appeal, one signature fundraising event, major gifts solicitations and grant writing. A successful capital campaign in 2010-2011 allowed for the purchase and renovation of the Center's current home at 2545 West 26th Street in Erie.

The Erie Lions Club

The Erie Lions Club and the Sight Center have a symbiotic relationship that has existed for over 50 years due to our mutual service goals. With funds raised from the annual Save-an-Eye All-Star Football Game, the Erie Lions Club helps needy children and adults to obtain eye care through the Sight Center and local eye care providers. The Save-an-Eye Fund also provides for special, non-budget needs of the Center such as capital equipment needs and initiating pilot projects. The staff of the Sight Center is active in promoting the annual football game and the Center provides office space and support to “house” the projects of the Erie Lions Club.

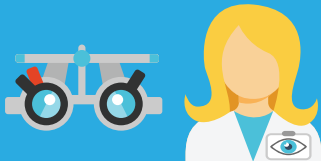
Specialized Services

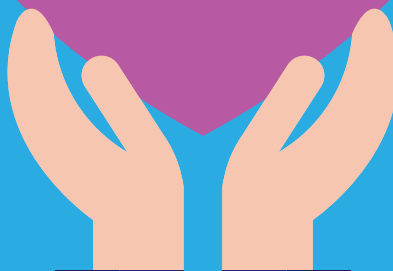
Vision Rehabilitation



Nearly **300 new patients** who are losing their vision are seen each year in our low vision clinic. About **300 devices** including magnifiers, lights and other tools were dispensed. Over **160 of our patients** followed up with our occupational therapist to make further adaptations to their home or daily routines to **best support** their individual needs for independence.

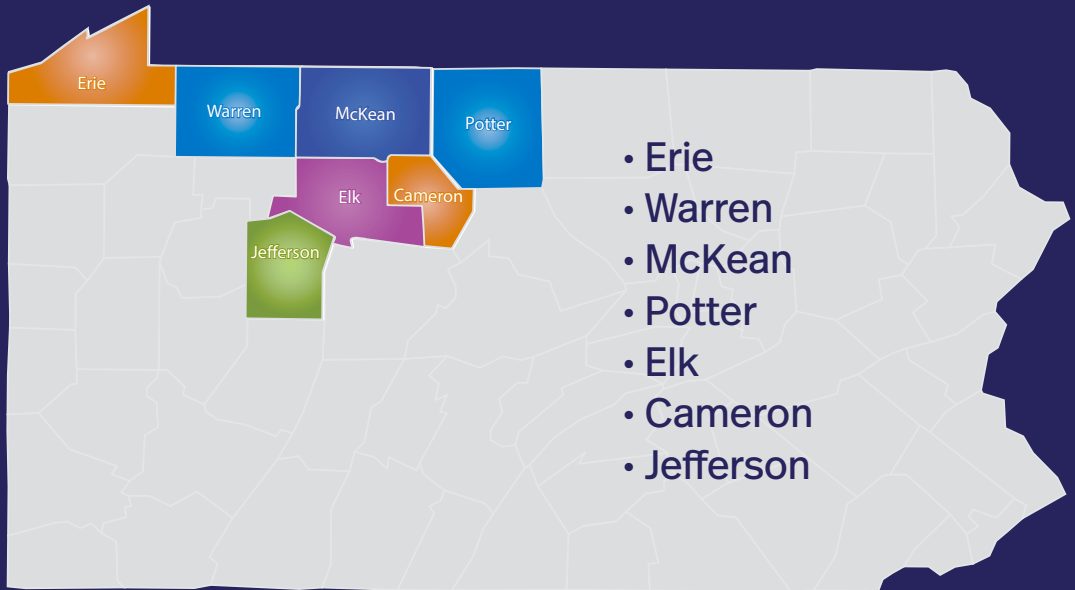


In addition to prevention, the Sight Center reached more than **1,000 community members** with educational programs about **eye health and safety**.
